Main Idea

A man's commitment to God's purposes changes live.

Key Scriptures

I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things and count them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ.

Start doing.

- Read 1 Corinthians 9:24-27. How does it impact your week to, "run with purpose in every step"? Is that a reasonable expectation?
- What can you do this week to demonstrate a recommitment to the purposes of Christ in your life?
